- These descriptions are shown in graphical representations.


Research Questions

 - Relations between man and societal values (ideologies or even ethics)


Hobbes Leviathan

Knowledge Based Economy

- "The term "knowledge based economy" results from a fuller recognition of the role of technology and knowledge in economic growth" (OECD, 1996, p.9)
- The worth of a common computer only consists of about 5% manual labor. The remainder is intellectual capital (Bühl, 1996)
- "Knowledge-intensive service sectors, such as education, and communication, are growing even faster. Indeed, it is estimated that more than 50% of Gross Domestic Product (GDP) in the major OECD economies is now knowledge based" (OECD, 1996, p.9).

Certain Problems

- Within agrarian society the ownership of land has been the structuring category.
- Within industrial society occupations have been the structuring category.

If we try to use knowledge as the structuring category of knowledge society we have certain problems:

- exclusive private ownership of knowledge
- exchanging knowledge

Conclusion

Yes, the popular term *knowledge society* describes society in the same meaning as the terms *agrarian and industrial society*.

To use this term in order to give a graphical representation of knowledge society causes the mentioned problems.
